PROPAGATING NATIVE PLANTS

A cooperative effort between Wabana Township, Itasca Waters, University of Minnesota North Central Experiment Station, and Grand Rapids Horticulture class and the Wabana Chain of Lakes Association (WCOLA) has been completed at the Wabana Town Hall. The University planted the seeds of 4 varieties of native plants provided by Prairie Restoration for Itasca Waters to use in demonstration gardens in Itasca County. They are Agastache foeniculum (Fragrant giant hyssop), Doellingeria umbellate (flat topped aster), Heliopsis helianthoides (Common ox-eye), and Monarda fistulosa (wild bergamot). All provide flowers for pollinators and have large root systems that control erosion and filter water. Planting was done at the KAXE Pedestrian Bridge and at the YMCA garden as well. Plants were germinated, then repotted by the Grand Rapids High School horticulture class and planted at the Wabana Town Hall where they will provide a showy demonstration for years to come. These plants need little care and many beneficial organisms use them for food and reproduction. Locally native plants are now stocked and sold at both green houses in Grand Rapids. Itasca Waters website (Itascawaters.org) provides additional information on the Shoreland Steward Program and many ideas for controlling erosion and buffering shoreline.





The Boat Wash is OPEN!

Wabana Township and WCOLA have helped fund the public-access inspection program that helps prevent aquatic invasive species (AIS) from spreading, but inspectors can't be at the landings 24/7. Public landings are only one entry path among many. We all have a prevention role ... property owners, guests, recreational boaters, anglers, visitors, and the businesses that serve us, including resorts, camps, campgrounds, lake service providers, bait shops, and marine dealers. You and your guests can help!



AIS are not moved by waterfowl or other wildlife. *They're*



moved by us. We move AIS from one lake or river to another, via boats, trailers, bilge, live well, bait water, fishing and other water gear, docks, lifts, swim rafts, float planes, and recreational gear. Please take time to read carefully: Clean, Drain, and Dry your boats and equipment as you move from one body of water to another. Also remember to properly dispose of any extra bait as you leave each body of water. Put the bait in the trash receptacle at the landing.

Another tool to help stop the spread of AIS is a Boat Wash Station. Through your generosity and donations, WCOLA, in partnership with Wabana Township, has purchased a hotwater boat wash station that will be housed at the Wabana Township Hall.

The Boat Wash is "manned" Thursday to Sunday, and available for self-service at other times (cold-water only).
